SNIPPETS OF BLACKPOOL SHUL HISTORY

- The first recorded Jew in Blackpool was S Leman, of Gosforth Road, who settled in Blackpool in 1897.
- A meeting on 13th May 1898, at Mr. Latte's Trevelyan Hotel, Blackpool, agreed to form a Hebrew Congregation. The first services were above a shop in Church Street.
- The first Synagogue, in Springfield Road, was consecrated on 17th May 1900 by Chief Rabbi Hermann Adler (Chief Rabbi from 1891 1911).
- In **July 1901** Rabbi I Simon, Locum Minister, was presented with a "handsome silver tea-urn" in recognition of "his service in the formation of the Synagogue".
- Two Jews, three opinions. By 1905 a dissident "Blackpool New Hebrew Orthodox Congregation" vied with the original Blackpool Hebrew Congregation for members.
- In 1907, D L Alexander, President of the Board of Deputies, intervened such that the two communities combined to form the "Blackpool United Hebrew Congregation". BUHC's Centenary was thus in 2007.
- By 1910 the congregation had 37 members, and by 1914, over seventy souls.
- The Rev Daniel Caplan's salary in 1912 was £58 10s but he received an additional £2 13s and 6d for killing poultry. We believe the latter payment was not popular with the chickens.
- In 1913, work began on the new synagogue in Leamington Road and the following appeal went out in March 1914:

APPEAL FOR £2,000.

Much 1914

The Blackpool Jewish Community consists at present of about 50 resident paying members, but in the Season these are largely augmented by visitors.

During the last 16 years, service has been held in a room situated in the Metropole Arcade, Springfield Road, the situation of which is excellent, but in all other respects the accommodation is entirely inadequate for the needs of the community at the present time.

It is too small and both the ventilation and sanitary arrangements are very unsatisfactory. The entrance to the Synagogue from the street is common to a Turkish Bath, Billiard Saloon, and a Cinematograph Show, and there is an engine in connection with the latter working in the basement beneath the Synagogue.

There is no suitable provision for Cloak Rooms, Vestry, or Class Rooms, and through lack of the latter, the religious education of the children is not up to that standard which its importance demands.

A large and representative Committee has been appointed, and in order to avoid, if possible, the financial responsibility of building, they have made continued efforts in the following directions:—

Firstly.—They have negotiated with the proprietors of the Metropole Arcade to enlarge and improve the present Synagogue.

Secondly,—They have made efforts to secure Rooms in other buildings in the

Thirdly.—They have made efforts to hire or purchase one or two adjoining houses, with a view to convert the same into a Synagogue, etc.

After many months of strenuous work, it has been found impossible to succeed in any of the above-mentioned directions, and finally it has been decided to acquire a suitable plot of freehold land, and to erect thereon a Synagogue, Class Rooms, and Offices. This apparently ambitious scheme has been made feasible by the munificent offer of Mr. Mark Shaffer, the President of the Congregation, to purchase a freehold site, and to present it to the Congregation with a donation to the Building Fund of a sum equal to the difference between the cost of the land and the sum of £500.

A very suitable freehold piece of land on the Raikes Hall Estate has been acquired by Mr. Shaffer at a cost of £388 14s. 8d., and will in due course be conveyed to the trustees of the Congregation.

Encouraged by the splendid example, other members of the community have together subscribed about £500 to the Building Fund. and the Committee confidently anticipate that they will be able to raise a further sum of about £500 from the residents of Blackpool.

The Committee have approved of plans providing a suitable Synagogue with all necessary Class Rooms and Offices, at an estimated cost of £3000, and, taking into consideration, on the one hand the smallness of the community, and on the other the large amount raised locally, the Committee feel justified in confidently appealing to their co-religionists in London and the provinces for £2000, which amount it is estimated will be required to enable the Synagogue to be opened free from debt—aconsummation very much to be desired. Our Scheme has received the approval of the Chief Rabbi, and Mr. D. L. Alexander, K.C., copies of whose letters are enclosed.



In 1915 the congregation Annual Report said "War deems it advisable to at once stop all canvass for funds". Given this, it is all the more remarkable that the shull building, originally planned as a ten year project in 1913, was completed and opened in 1916.

By 1916 five sons of the community were serving in war. Not all returned. Nat Levene's memorial, the first commemorative service took place on 17th September (below, left).



- The first wedding in the new shul, actually in 1915 before the official opening, was of Yetta Scheff (brother to Nat) and Leon Levene. This was reported in the Gazette & Herald (right)
- The Minister's house at 18 Woodland Grove was rated at £8 15s 4d in 1922.
- In 1928 a contract was established between Mark Shaffer, for the shul and "Morris Freedman, a butcher", relating to the selling and slaughtering of Kosher meat - for the sum of two pounds per week in licence fees.

JEWISH WEDDING.

FIRST IN NEW SYNAGOGUE.



Levene—Scheff,

A fashionable wedding that aroused great interest in local circles, particularly among those of the Hebrew faith, was solemized in the new Synagogue in Leannington-road, Blackpool, on Wednesday afternoon. The bridegroom was Leon Levene, M.B., B.S., the elder son of Mr. Lewis Levene, is a Liout, in the 5th Irish King's street, Blackpool, and the bride Vetta Scheff, the youngest daughter of the late Rev. A. I. Scheff, who was formerly at Nottingham. Dr. Levene has given up a hospitel appointment in London in order to accept a commission in the R.A.M.C., and will join the forces at the close of the honeymoon. His only brother, Mr. N. Levene, is a Lieut in the 8th (Irish King's Liverpool Regiment, and he obtained leave to attend the ceremony, in which he figured as the best man.

The ceremony was conducted according to the fail Jewish rites by the Rev. Daniel Laplan, the minister of the Blackpool Hebrew congregation, assisted by the Rev. A. Miller, a brother in-law of the bride, of the Dundee Synagogue. When the bride and bridegroom took their places under the handsome canopy there was a crowded congregation, who followed the service with great interest. It was the first of its kind to be held in the Synagogue, and was therefore all the more notable.

- In 1932 a dispute between the shul and Blackpool Council, regarding an amount for the renewal of the lease at the public abbatoirs for Shechita, was agreed by Mark Shaffer JP for an annual rate of £15 15s.
- The 1933-34 accounts' highest expenditure was a donation of £111 14s 6d to the Ukranian and German Relief Fund, with £87 15s 6d collected from members. Rev Arkush's tram contract that year was £4 10s.
- Rev David Garbaz (Garb) arrived in May 1939, aged 29, on £338 per annum and lived at 21 Leicester Road. This was paid weekly each Thursday with two weeks holiday a year - which had to be taken in June.
- A lot of families were evacuated to Blackpool in WWII, and many stayed. When Rev Reuben Restan came in 1946 he lived at 12 Lincoln Road. He was paid £1 1s for each Tahara on top of his salary.
- In 1948, Harry Ramm, President, sought support from the new congregation in St Annes, having done a deal with RHO Hills to create a kosher kitchen there, but which needed full Fylde communal support.
- Eli Caplan gained his licence to operate as a Kosher Baker at 84 High Street, Blackpool in July 1950.



- The buildings insurance policy in 1951 included cover for "impact from aircraft or articles dropped therefrom".
- The Nathan Scheff Hall was opened by Scheff himself in 1955.
- In December 1963 the shul licensed the New Continental Hotel, Queen's Promenade for kashruth. Tinned foods used were not to contain "meat stock, animal fats, treifa oils or treifa fish".
- In July 1964 Sidney Cohen, President, got a concession from the Rabbinical Commission for the Licensing Of Shochetim for a licence fee of only £1 1s - "in consequence of special pleading".
- 1973 saw the community appoint its first ordained Rabbi, Benjamin Rabinowitz BA, MPhil, AJC - in his first posting.
- From a peak after the war, by the late 70s the community had begun a slow decline as younger members sought roots outside the town: mostly to Manchester and London.
- The last wedding in the shul was on 23rd August 1992 when Andrew Kaye married Vanessa Black.
- Blackpool's last, and longest-serving, Minister was Rabbi David Braunold whom we're delighted to see at today's service.


